## • Annual General Meeting •

NRIG hosted their 2018 AGM on November 15th, 2018 at McMaster University. Despite the inclement weather it was a successful evening of networking and reconnecting opportunities for the AGM's attendants. This year's AGM featured a talk from distinguished scientist, Dr. Bernice Downey.

Dr. Downey is a medical Anthropologist with the School of Nursing at McMaster University since 2017. She is cross- appointed with the Department of Psychiatry and Neuro-Behavioural Sciences and is the Indigenous Health Lead for the Faculty of Health Science at McMaster. Dr. Downey is also the Regional Aboriginal Cancer Lead for Cancer Care Ontario, Toronto- Central. Her research interests include Indigenous health, health literacy, Indigenous Traditional knowledge and health/research system reform for Indigenous populations. Dr. Downey has participated on multiple, national and international Indigenous research policy initiatives.

We had the honour of having Dr. Downey share her research experience with Indigenous peoples and the implications for nurse researchers undertaking research with Indigenous populations. Dr. Downey emphasized the unique culture of Indigenous peoples and that culture is a determinant of health, therefore cultural knowledge is vital to address community health needs, develop culturally relevant programs and policies and ensure culturally competent healthcare. This includes developing an understanding in conducting research with Indigenous

peoples. For example, Indigenous knowledge is valid and important knowledge that must be utilized. Despite the challenges of conducting ethical research with Indigenous people, nurse researchers are making positive advances, by building authentic relationships with Indigenous communities, conducting collaborative research and ensuring study aims are to the betterment of Indigenous people. Finally, Dr. Downey encourages us to learn about colonization, its continued impact on Indigenous people and Indigenous cultures and traditions if we want to undertake research with Indigenous peoples. A question and answer session followed Dr. Downey's presentation.

NRIG would like to thank Dr. Downey for sharing her work and passion for nursing research! Thank you to all who braved the storm and attended the 2018 AGM and to those who contributed to its success.

### • Recipient Spotlight•



THARSHIKA SUGUMARAN, the NRIG Research Award recipient, is a paediatric nurse at McMaster Children's Hospital and greatly enjoys working with children and their families and advocating for their needs. She has continuously sought to further her knowledge and advance her nursing profession though various opportunities. Currently Tharshika is completing a thesis-based Masters of Nursing exploring the impact of diabetes coaching on community-based adults who have Type II diabetes. Upon completing her studies, she hopes to investigate new areas of nursing including research and clinical education.







JESSICA LACHANCE, a Graduate Scholarship recipient, successfully defended her MScN at the Arthur Labatt Family School of Nursing at Western University in August of 2018 under the supervision of Dr. Richard Booth, entitled: Exploring unmet healthcare needs, healthcare access, and the use of Complementary and Alternative Medicine in adults with chronic pain: A crosssectional analysis of the National Population Health Survey. Immediately following, she was invited to submit her findings to a peer-reviewed academic journal and is currently in the final stages of manuscript preparation. In addition, she will be presenting her findings to diverse, international audiences at three conferences in the upcoming months: The Great Lakes Biennial Nursing Convention in Windsor; INCAM Research Symposium in Montreal, and; Creating Healthy Work Environments hosted by Sigma in New Orleans, Louisiana.

In September 2108, Jessica began work toward a PhD in Nursing at the Arthur Labatt Family School of Nursing at Western University under the supervision of Dr. Lorie Donelle. In addition to continuing to develop her work with women with chronic pain, she is actively contributing to several ongoing research projects with colleagues at Western to develop expertise and experience in the areas of critical and feminist theory, database research, and the health and social implications of the cannabis legalization.

Jessica also volunteers as the Communications Executive Nursing Officer on the RNAO Middlesex-Elgin Chapter and enjoys collaborating events that promote life-long learning and support of nurses in her region. She is so grateful for the support from the NRIG scholarship, without which her thesis completion would not have been possible.



KAREN CAMPBELL, a Graduate Scholarship recipient, is a fourth-year PhD student at McMaster University, School of Nursing. Ms. Campbell's work has predominantly focused on supporting young mothers, with over 15 years of experience as a public health nurse. Her program of research is at the intersection of women's health and rural geography. Her dissertation examines the Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP), a public health nursing intervention program for socially and economically disadvantaged mothers. Ms. Campbell will be determining the modifications and adaptations that are necessary for NFP to be successful in rural Canadian communities.





LINDA SHEIBAN TAUCAR, a Research Grant recipient, is a Registered Nurse and currently holds the position of Associate Research Chair at the Schlegel Centre for Advancing Seniors Care at Conestoga College. She began her research career by attaining a Master's degree in Health Studies and Gerontology at the University of Waterloo. Her thesis work explored the experiences of healthcare providers who care for those with dementia in primary care memory clinics. Linda now uses her joint clinical and research knowledge in her position as Associate Research Chair by coordinating and conducting gerontological research, focusing on evidence-based care in gerontology and gerontological curriculum development. Linda's current works aims to explore nursing faculty's experiences of integrating RNAO's Best Practice Guidelines into nursing curricula. This work will inform Conestoga College as they begin the journey of becoming a Best Practice Spotlight Organization.

### • Membership Report •

In the 2017-2018 fiscal year, NRIG had a total of 1,935 members. Of these members, 386 were Registered Nurses while 1,549 were nursing students. Membership has been steadily increasing over the last five fiscal years, with a drop in membership noted this year in comparison to the 2016-2017 fiscal year.

NRIG membership recruitment efforts have been focused on reaching out to universities with Graduate Nursing Programs, including junior and senior faculty as well as nursing students through the promotion of NRIG memberships during student events. The wide distribution of our NRIG Newsletters helped to keep our members engaged and informed about nursing research funding opportunities. Supporting the ongoing scholarship and research involvement of our members has been identified as a key recruitment strategy through our Membership Survey.
