All those present had the opportunity to share aspects of their practice and resources. We learned from each other, about our successes and challenges. Parish nurses are offering a wide range of activities, such as youth dropins, falls prevention and elder abuse workshops, exercise classes, divorce recovery programs, and coordinating lay pastoral visitors. Some nurses participate in Out-of-the-Cold programs held in their churches. working life. Cheri does this confidently, unashamedly wearing her clerical collar to indicate her Christian values and foundations. She freely celebrates the Eucharist often to develop inclusiveness and community.

Cheri acknowledges her teenage experiences as a school drop-out, living on the street. However, in her youth, she found her faith which has informed

Queen's Park on the Road 2018

Queen's Park on the Road (QPOR) is an effective political engagement activity for members. The opportunity to meet with MPPs to discuss priority nursing and health issues empowers nurses and demonstrates that they can make an impact on public policy and influence healthy change for patients, their co-workers, friends and family alike. QPOR allows us to meet MPP's at their riding offices every year.

Through QPOR, registered nurses, nurse practitioners and nursing students raise issues and make recommendations that matter to them. RNAO provides resources to assist with MPP meetings.

On November 5th, I met with High Park/Parkdale MPP, Bhutila Karpoche in my role as Acting Policy and Political Rep (PAN) for PNIG. Discussions focused on the following key issues: Reclaiming the role of the RN; increasing access to NPs; transforming LTC; anchoring the health care system in primary care; and increase access to Safe Injection Sites (SIS) and Opioid Prevention Sites (OPS).

Parish Nursing Education Program

We send warm greetings to all of you on behalf of the Foundations in Parish Nursing Program at the Institute for Ongoing Formation at St Peter's Seminary in London, ON. We are very proud to share with you that eight nurses from across Canada attended the most recent Summer Residency program in July. It was held at Brescia University College which is an onsite campus of Western University in London ON. This week-long program introduced the nurses to parish nursing and focused on the spiritual call to ministry. For many, their journey continues as they returned to their faith communities and are currently working towards a Certificate in Parish Nursing which includes the completion of two on-line courses, a comprehensive mentored and practicum experience in a faith community and a final three-day educational opportunity in the Summer of 2019 which will include their graduation and dedication ceremony.

Since the establishment of the Foundations Program in 2010, 68 nurses from across Canada and many Christian faith backgrounds have been part of the program. Each has attended with a desire to learn about incorporating spirituality into their current nursing practice and to learn about parish nursing and establishing a parish nurse ministry in a faith community.

Our current faculty consists of Louise Trapp as Program Coordinator, Elsie Millerd as Education Coordinator and Faye Brekelmans as Coordinator of On-line Courses. The Last Great Plague, the Story of the Spanish Flu

To commemorate the centennial of the Spanish Flu, an exhibit was staged in St. James Cathedral. It was titled, The Last Great Plague, the Story of the Spanish Flu, and was on display from October 18 to November 1, 2018. In

1918, during the final year of the First World War, an intense influenza pandemic took hold of the front lines in Europe. Infected Canadian soldiers returned home carrying the virus which then spread rampantly throughout the population and in every part of the country.

Today, little is known of the devastation this terrible flu caused. This exhibit provided moving personal family stories and described the impact it had in Canada, Toronto, and our very own Cathedral. It was an international pandemic and in Canada an estimated 55,000 people died, just fewer than the 60,000 Canadians killed during the First World War. It is estimated that one-third of the world's population became infected, and mortality was high in healthy adults in the 20-40 ag

high in healthy adults in the 20-40 age group.

Stories were told of a father who died of the flu and was buried in Belgium and of a brother and sister, age 5 and 6, who were left orphans when both parents died of the flu. Cabinets displayed artifacts such as bottle collections from Gooderham Worts, containing so-called cures. Toronto was featured for the effort of Connaught Labs to develop a vaccine.

The cathedral's major role was through Adelaide Plumptre, wife of the Dean of St. James from 1909 to 1935. She was appointed Superintendent of Supplies across Canada and in 1916, the emergency department of the Canadian Red Cross was set up in the parish house. A photo shows volunteers at work preparing sterilized dressing, face masks and pneumonia jackets to send to hospitals throughout the world. As a result of the tragedy and inability to respond to the epidemic, the Federal Department of Health was created in 1919.

St. James already had a long and recorded history of concern for the sick. In 1812, under then Rector John Strachan, the Church was used as a hospital, and he also established the first hospital and medical school in Toronto. In this exhibit, Cathedral Archivist & Museum Curator, Nancy Mallett, also wanted to cover the continuing story of the response and role of the church in more recent epidemic/ pandemics, such as are HIV/AIDS, SARS, and H1N1.

Reverend Canon Douglas Graydon, Coordinator of Chaplaincy Services, and I were invited to contribute this perspective. Douglas Graydon, was appointed Chair of the Diocese Pandemic Preparedness Committee, and as cathedral parish nurse, I served on the committee, which developed a comprehensive Pandemic Response Plan.

We have benefit from the experience of the Spanish Influenza, in that it resulted in the establishment of federal, provincial and city public health systems. Together with medical research and advances in healthcare, and parish/faith community nurses, the churches are better able to respond to health crisis. Nurses have a unique perspective and role, supplementing and collabo-

rating with our public health care systems, thus establishing a wholistic community health place in our churches.

Communications ENO and Member Gloria Wiebe shared these photos and an article about a recent Parish Nursing exhibit on the 100 year anniversary of a significant time in medical history. We have come a long way...
