As mentioned, the Sudbury & District Chapter developed and submitted, in collaboration with the Northeast Gerontological Nurses' Association, a resolution for consideration at the upcoming provincial AGM.

The resolution calls for RNAO to advocate the provincial government to institute legislative reform and infrastructure development to support professional intervention in cases of suspected abuse and mistreatment of vulnerable adults living at home and receiving care by informal caregivers.
