As a Registered Nurse with 16 years of experience working with older adults across the health spectrum, Dr. Chu's primary area of research is in designing technology-enabled interventions that support the mobility and daily function of older adults in post-acute care settings (e.g. long-term care, rehabilitation, community). The major focuses are: person-centred interventions; co-designing and evaluating innovative technology that is translatable into practice. She has over 60 publications, holds 2 patents, and has over \$1.8 million in funding from multiple Tri-Council Funding Agencies and other sources.

Dr. Amy Wright is an Assistant Professor in the Lawrence S. Bloomberg Faculty of Nursing at the University of Toronto. In collaboration with a group of Indigenous mothers in the Hamilton, Ontario area, she created an exciting initiative, *Healing the Hurt*. *Healing the Hurt* is a website featuring a short video series in which Indigenous mothers and service providers share their experiences of seeking health care for themselves and their infants. The website is directed at health providers in Canada, with the hopes that they will watch the videos and read the information to supplement their own learning about cultural safe health care.

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission calls for all health providers (students and those currently practicing) to be educated about the history of Indigenous Peoples and the impact of colonization both past and present. This resource is an important way to support this Call to Action, and can help to improve experiences for Indigenous communities.

NRIG Novice Researcher Grant Valued at \$3000

Dr. Connie Schumacher

Dr. Schumacher is an Assistant Professor in Nursing at Brock University. Connie has over 25 years of clinical experience in critical care and community care. She is this year's AMS Fellow in Compassion and Artificial Intelligence. Research interests include senior's care, chronic disease management, interRAI applications, and promoting evidence-based care in the home care sector. Her project involves a mixed methods study evaluating deployment of a new interRAI instrument for care coordination during the COVID-19 pandemic. She seeks to understand the unique contexts of conducting comprehensive virtual and telephone assessments with home care patients.

I graduated from Western with a BScN degree in 2013. For my first nursing job I worked in complex care in Timmins and District Hospital. UPCOMING OPPORTUNITIES



The NCSBN Center for Regulatory Excellence Grant funds projects that advance the science of nursing policy and regulation and build regulatory expertise worldwide. Submission deadline September 30, 2022. Funds available: Up to US\$300,000.



The Banting and Best Diabetes Centre Drucker Family Innovation Fund Grants 2023/2024 have an application deadline of September 20, 2022. Funds available: up to \$50,000. New this year, the application deadline for the Diabetes Team of the Year Award is October 18, 2022. Applicants should check eligibility carefully.



The Foundation for Women's Cancer (US) is offering several grants. The FWC M4H Research Grant (all gynecologic cancers) and the Grant in Memory of Peggy A. Yates (all gynecologic cancers except ovarian cancer). Funds available: US\$50,000. Diversity and Health Equity Research Grants: Value \$75,000 (two grants). The Amy Krouse Rosenthal Foundation Early Detection Research Grant offers \$75,000 over two years (\$150,000 total). Ovarian Cancer: The National Ovarian Cancer Coalition Early Detection Research Grant offers US \$50,000 over one year. The National Ovarian Cancer Coalition Quality of Life Research Grant offers US\$50,000 over one year. The AstraZeneca Young Investigator Stimulus Research Grant for Ovarian Cancer Research offers US\$50,000



SSHRC and WAGE Gender-based Violence Research Initiative supports academic researchers partnering with other research-focused and community-based organizations to advance knowledge on and analyse the causes and persistence of GBV in Canada. Value: Up to \$700,000 over four years. Application deadline: anytime until October 6, 2022. MRA deadline is noon, September 22, 2022.

SSHRC's Partnership Development Grant is now open for applications. Submission deadline is November 15, 2022. Funds available: \$75,000 to \$200,000 for one to three years. Funds can support knowledge mobilization as well as test new partnership approaches for research.



The Debra Spunt Research Grant from the International Nursing Association for Clinical Simulation and Learning application deadline is October 9, 2022. The competition is open to INACSL members only.



UPCOMING OPPORTUNITIES



The American Association of Critical-Care Nurses offers two grants: the AACN Impact Research Grant, which awards three grants of up to US\$50,000 each; and the AACN Sigma Theta Tau Critical Care Grant, which awards one grant of up to US\$10,000. The application for both opens on Monday August 29, 2022, with full application due Friday October 28, 2022.



The Canadian Lung Association grant competition registration deadlines are September 9, 2022, with full applications due October 7, 2022. Funds available: Allied Health Research Grant: awardee must secure at least 50% of the budget as matching funds (to a maximum of \$10,000). Allied Health Research Fellowship Award (masters or doctoral students): annual stipend is based on a 50:50 match between the lung association and the trainee’s supervisor; for full-time students, the Canadian Lung Association will contribute a maximum of \$5,000. Research Fellowship and Studentships (MD and PhD students): Matching funding is required.

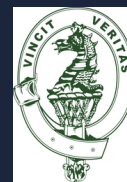
