It will be held on May 31st, 2025, in a format like last year's spring symposium. With the increasing cost of living, an in-person meeting was impossible this year. Pediatric surgery at our McMaster Site

- 1) The opening of the Same Day Overnight Unit (SDO) to monitor post op patients who would stay in the hospital for less than 23 hours. These patients are cared for in the Post Anesthetic Care Unit (PACU) overnight and monitored by 1 RPN and 2 RN's and discharged from the facility by 0700 the day after surgery
- 2) Our idiopathic scoliosis patients are no longer requiring ICU admissions, instead patients are admitted to regular ward beds post op and our length of stays for these patients are decreasing
- 3) We have recently opened a pediatric step down unit (PICU Level 2) which has eased the number of PICU Level 3 admissions. We have been able to send a solid group of neurosurgery patients, complex medical children, and lengthy surgical cases to stepdown safely
- 4) We have started to move away from low dose ketamine for post op pain control in our pediatric population. Teams have found many patients to have unwanted effects that we are trying to minimize in hopes of earlier discharge possibilities
- 5) Cryoablation has been introduced to our NUSS procedures. This technology offers patients greater pain control after the 24-hour mark of surgery by freezing the intercostal nerves. This patient population can now be discharged home the day after surgery
- 6) Peripheral nerve blocks are slowly being offered to pediatric patients. Many of our orthopedic/sports injury patients, plastics, and NUSS procedures are having great success with improved pain control. Additionally, our PACU has been involved in a study documenting the effectiveness of peripheral nerve blocks in urology and general surgery patients. PACU nurses are fully invested in helping our



anesthesia colleagues offer this to our pediatric populations. Below is an educational pamphlet (still in draft) that one of our very dedicated anesthesiologists is preparing for our patient's education needs post op

Nerve Block Post op instructions

Frequently Asked Questions

Can they take pain pills now, even though they are still numb?

Yes. There is no interaction between the local anesthetic we gave you and the pain pills you were prescribed.

They are still having some numbness even after 24 hours, is this normal?

While uncommon, some patients have residual numbness after receiving a nerve block but this typically resolves with time.

They are still having some pain despite having some numbness, is this normal?

Yes. It is NORMAL to experience some pain despite having a nerve block; especially when it is wearing off. Give the pain pills as prescribed by the surgeon.

Do they need to cover the injection site with any dressing or Rand-Aid?

No. The injections site is very small and will heal on its own.

Can they take a shower after a single shot peripheral nerve block?

Yes. As long as the block has worn off and someone can help them with balance and moving around.

- 7) Our Tonsil and Adenoid surgeries resumed late this fall. Not much of a change in practice for PACU nurses have changed in Phase I but we have now introduced the SPIT criteria patients and families must fully meet before discharge home (either same day or SDO):
 - S: Saturation on room air greater than 90% while awake or asleep
 - P: Pain adequately managed by oral medications
 - I: Intake of food/liquids appropriate for weight without vomiting



• T: Taking medications that are given by parents (parents must demonstrate this before discharge)

Adult surgery at our McMaster site has ramped up and had a few changes implemented

Until next time...

- 1) Minimally invasive endometriosis surgery is a new addition to this site. Many women who have been told that their endometriosis is not resectable or requires a total hysterectomy can now receive laparoscopic surgery and be discharged home same day with all their female reproductive organs intact.
- 2) We are beginning to monitor compliant obstructive sleep apnea gynecological patients in our SDO unit
- 3) Iron infusions are started in PACU for select gyne populations in the hopes of improving post op quality of life, early mobilization, post op anemia resulting in readmission to hospital, and enhanced recovery. The following patients qualify for iron infusion therapy
 - Post-op ruptured ectopic pregnancy with significant blood loss (>500 mL) or starting Hb <100
 - Post-op ruptured ovarian cyst with significant blood loss (>500 mL) or starting Hb <100
 - Post-op spontaneous pregnancy loss with significant blood loss (>500mL) or starting Hb
 100

In other news, HHS is in the process of hiring a NP to work with the Acute Pain Service (APS). This will be of great value to our patients and assist our anesthesia colleagues immensely! We have also welcomed many new pediatric and adult anesthesiologists to our team. Stephanie Finelli, Regional Director Southern ON

Central West Regional Update:

At Trillium Health Partners, the perioperative team is working through the winter surge capacity issues and having to share the day surgery space with inpatients overnight to avoid cancellation of planned surgeries. The day surgery staff and inpatients teams are working so well together to identify appropriate patients for overnight in the day surgery space. There was a small working group who worked through all the details including inclusion and exclusion criteria, working plan to trigger involvement from supporting departments (pharmacy, housekeeping, portering, allied, lab, DI, bed reservations) and communications to family, patients, and surgeons. It is a challenge in the daytime to ensure that the day surgery patient flow is not affected, but thus far, the teamwork has been amazing with great outcomes for all patients.

The PACU team is working on their policies to support discharge from PACU on the weekend or after hours. This is again in alignment with capacity issues and to have the right patient in the right place at the right time. With ER overflow and sometimes 50-85 patients in ER with no beds available, this is a plan that makes sense for all. The PACU team is becoming familiar with phase 2 discharge criteria and learning discharge instructions and teaching points to safely discharge home from PACU.
