Conference Grant (1 x \$500)

The NRIG Conference Grant will be awarded to a NRIG member who is attending or presenting at a conference (preference to NRIG members presenting and those who have no alternative conference funding). Applicants must be a member of NRIG. Preference will be given to those who have been a member for a minimum of 2 years.

Undergraduate Scholarship (1 x \$500)

I am a critical care nurse and graduate student researcher conducting a study about patients who cannot vocalize and how this impacts their capacity for decision making.
